I guess I'll start with my most recent first: I had the opportunity to give my first State of the County speech at the Elk Grove Chamber of Commerce luncheon. In it, I highlighted work on five of my top priorities: homelessness, crime, roads, flood response and something most of us, including myself prior to assuming this role, don't even know is a problem.

You may recall in last month's edition, I wrote about Ambulance Patient Offload Time, or APOT – commonly referred to as "wall time" - a serious issue for our emergency departments and our first responders. I was fortunate enough to take part in a productive convening of every fire agency and health care system in the region on the matter recently. It was a productive first step and I am committed to sticking with this issue to ensure we correct a failing system so that everyone receives the care they need when they need it, the burden on our emergency rooms is relieved and our first responders are freed up and available for the next emergency call.

Another first, I recently co-hosted a community meeting on transportation with my colleague Supervisor Rich Desmond. It was a great turnout and people seemed thankful to receive an update on our efforts as well as our hurdles. We are currently planning more community meetings throughout the District so if I haven't been to your neighborhood yet, we will be somewhere close soon.

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State Fair & County Agriculture

Agriculture in Sacramento is not just for the State Fair

Summer brings high temperatures and the State Fair to Sacramento. Many of us enjoyed the July traditions of walking through Cal Expo, riding the Tilt-a-Whirl, eating a jumbo corndog or a bacon wrapped corn cob on a stick, and maybe even some cow milking. The State Fair is also a celebration of all that agriculture brings to our communities.

California's first state fair was held on October 4, 1854, in San Francisco and was hosted by a different city each year until it came to Sacramento in 1961, where it has stayed to this day. As far back as that first year, the state fair has been the place to go where folks who lived in big cities or small farms could come to see livestock, exhibits of agriculture, and agricultural products from across California. In more recent



history, the exhibition has come to highlight each counties' local pride.

From really big pigs to blue ribbon jams, jellies and wine, our County has much to be proud of too.

In our most recent annual *County Crop & Livestock Report*, Sacramento County's farmgate was \$568 million, an increase in 2021 of 20% over the prior year. Wine grapes were once again our highest valued commodity at \$454.7 million, outpacing milk as our second highest valued commodity at \$204.4 million.



Many of my favorites and maybe yours also realized great growth in demand, with cherries up in value by 63%, tomatoes (for processing) up 45%, and almonds up 35%.

Our top five exports are almonds, walnuts, pears, yams and American hazelnuts. It is hard to imagine the reach of our locally grown bounty but consider what 133

million pounds of almonds look like, or 2.6 million pounds of walnuts, or 1.8 million pounds of pears.



Well, 133 million pounds of almonds would look something like 33,250 small elephants marching out of Sacramento County to destinations far and wide.

Sacramento County exports these commodities and many more to 60 countries including India, China, Hong Kong, French Polynesia, United Arab Emirates, Mexico, Turkey, New Zealand, Morocco and Canada. My wife and I dearly love to travel and explore other cultures but cannot begin to say we're likely to collect all these stamps in our passports.

While the State Fair is over for another year, our agricultural bounty remains plentiful. Get out to a Farmers Market near you, enjoy all the flavors

that abound us, and please say thank you to our local farmers, ranchers and vintners. In our County, you can visit many Farmers Markets year-round or at least until Thanksgiving.



and Courtland's Pear Fair in July. It doesn't grow on trees, bushes or vines, but you might also want to mark your calendar for Sacramento's Grilled Cheese Festival in April next year.

Alchemist Academy

Alchemist Community Development Corporation (CDC) is kicking off their 9th academy with open applications until August 20th. The Alchemist Microenterprise Academy (AMA) is a 12-week business training course designed to provide budding entrepreneurs with the fundamentals of starting and growing a food business in the greater Sacramento region.

The program is especially for those who are from low-income backgrounds or under-resourced communities. AMA covers important topics such as business financing, permitting, marketing, developing a business plan, and so much more to help entrepreneurs start and grow successful food businesses.



The Fall 2023 program is limited to 20 participants. Classes are mostly held on Zoom with loads of opportunity to ask questions and engage with a dynamic community of likeminded entrepreneurs, staff, and expert guest speakers.

Completing AMA is the prerequisite to apply for the Alchemist Kitchen Incubator Program (AKIP) where qualifying food businesses receive up to five years of one-on-one mentorship too.

Since AKIP began three years ago, it has grown to 24 businesses whose products can be found in 20 area stores; six different farmers markets; and in partnerships with cafes, restaurants, sporting events, and festivals that stretch beyond the 916 area code.

The in-depth program is full of information and AMA graduates are also eligible to benefit from the future Alchemist Public Market project.

To apply, consider participating in an AMA Information Sessions held live-on-Zoom on Tuesday August 8th and 14th from 6:00 -7:00 p.m. A pre-recorded, on-demand information session is also available for viewing any time before August 20th. These Information Sessions will explain the program and how to apply. It is mandatory to attend either a live-on-Zoom or complete the on-demand AMA Information Session in order to apply for the program.

Safety in High Temperatures





The summer months surely are upon us and we've already experienced multiple days of intense heat with temperatures rising over 100 degrees. In the month of August, forecasts are for 21 days over 90 degrees and 9 days over 95 degrees.

Some of our neighbors, friends and family members may be exceptionally affected by extreme heat. Particularly vulnerable are older adults, infants and children, pregnant women, folks with chronic conditions, outdoor workers, athletes, and those with chronic conditions. If you or someone you know falls into one or more of these categories, please be mindful of symptoms of heat related illness and look out for one another.

The County of Sacramento, through its Department of Human Assistance, activates cooling centers in response to extreme weather. These centers are located throughout the County with varying hours. Local libraries and City Halls are also resources to look to for cooling centers. Be sure to check 2-1-1 and 211sacramento.org for daily, updated information.

Stay hydrated and stay cool. Call 911 if a person is showing signs of Heat Stroke including confusion, dizziness, or becomes unconscious. Move the person to a cooler area, loosen clothing and remove extra layers, and cool with water or ice. Heat stroke can be life threatening.



Pets are also highly susceptible to heat and dehydration so make sure to keep them out of the intense sun and always provide access to fresh, clean water.



Symptoms of overheating in pets can include excessive panting, increased heart or respiratory rate, drooling, mild weakness or collapsing.

Certain breeds of pets, such as pugs and Persian cats, and pets that are elderly, overweight, or have heart and lung diseases are more at risk of overheating.


