



"The internal machinery of life, the chemistry of the parts, is something beautiful. And it turns out that all life is interconnected with all other life." – Richard P. Feynman

Did you know that the largest organism on earth is a 106-acre forest of aspen trees in Utah? What seems like 47,000 separate trees are actually interconnected via a single root system.

In many ways, the people, agencies and government systems that make up the county are like that; separate on the surface yet connected in ways we may not immediately see.

I'm often faced with policy decisions that, when viewed in isolation, seem easy to critique. But when you consider all the interconnected factors and the broader picture, that's when things start to come together and make sense. Just like those aspens trees, what looks separate often turns out to be deeply connected.

Some of my work on public safety and EMS issues are intertwined as well. MIH (Mobile Integrated Health) is a fantastic, innovative program that dispatches a higher level of care into the field when someone calls for help - basically a Licensed Vocational Nurse or Physician's Assistant that can triage and treat on the spot, saving the patient from needing a hospital transport. Naturally, this intersects with the work I have been leading on to reduce wait times in local emergency rooms.

I witnessed the fruits of this labor at a presentation at Sac Metro Fire Station 50 the other night. I was invited there by Hearts 4 Heroes, an incredible organization that places therapy dogs at firehouses and police stations to not only help with victims

and grief responses, but also to serve as support animals for the first responders who often carry the weight of these experiences long after the call is over. They presented me with a commemorative display in appreciation of the support I've offered their organization over the past couple of years. The gesture was an incredibly humbling moment, and I can't express how truly touched I was to receive this recognition, especially standing among the men and women who put their lives on the line to protect others.

While there, I also got to see one of the MIH units providing medical care and met some of the very talented people who staff the rig. One of them had sutured up a patient in the field, saving them a trip to the emergency room just earlier that day. This example of how interconnected the many pieces are around us is an important reminder to look out for one another, as we truly are in this together.

Bounty of the Season: 2024 Ag Report

As the year winds down and we move full-steam ahead into the holiday season, I find myself reflecting on the blessings in my life and the multitude of reasons I have to be thankful; for my family and friends, for the opportunity to live and work in this beautiful region of our state and, most especially that I get the chance to represent you here in this diverse and bountiful district.

Sacramento County has long been recognized as a cornerstone of California's agricultural landscape, and the rich abundance of our district is never more apparent than at this time of year as fields, vineyards and orchards continue to bless us with their rich, bountiful harvests.



In November, Agricultural Commissioner Chris Flores presented the 2024 Sacramento County Crop and Livestock Report to the Board of Supervisors where she reported that the gross production value of all agricultural commodities in Sacramento County was more than \$536 million. Wine grapes once again led the way as the county's top commodity,

generating more than \$167 million, accounting for over 31% of the county's total

crop output and highlighting the impact of Sacramento's vineyards on California's wine industry.

Market milk climbed to second place with a value of \$51.2 million, reflecting steady demand and strong dairy operations, passing up pears which came in number three with a total value of \$49.6 million, maintaining their role as a staple fruit crop in our region. Walnuts, ryegrass, almonds and corn for grain all recorded gains for 2024 over the previous year.

Agriculture is not only an economic driver, but also a vital part of preserving Sacramento County's rural character. Our diverse agricultural landscape includes many generational farms and ranches that produce everything from rice, corn and tomatoes to vital livestock and dairy operations.

There is a delicate symmetry among this landscape as each various sector plays a role in creating a balanced agrarian economy for our region. For example, local apiary (bee) operations enhance



pollination efforts for the county's booming fruit and nut crops which saw remarkable growth in 2024. All this underscores the county's dedication to maintaining a vibrant and sustainable approach to farming and production while balancing tradition with innovation.


A Well-Earned Retirement for Kernul



This month, we're putting a very special spotlight on one of the county's most dedicated and lovable employees: Kernul, Sacramento County's highly trained agricultural detector dog whose job was to keep pests out of Sacramento County and protect our agriculture.

Kernul, a nine-year-old chocolate Labrador retriever, spent his career at the county working alongside his handler, Michelle King. His journey began in 2018, when he was rescued from a shelter by the USDA and brought to the National Detector Dog Training Center in Newnan, Georgia, where he completed his training as an Agricultural Detection K9 before being placed in Sacramento County.

On any given day, Kernul could be found sniffing through parcel facilities including FedEx, UPS, and USPS, searching for unmarked packages containing agricultural materials such as produce, flowers, seeds, plants and soil.



Throughout his service, Kernul detected approximately 35,000 parcels containing agricultural material. Within those parcels, he and Michelle have found 600 live insects, more than 460 of which were invasive pests including the South American fruit fly, little fire ant, avocado whitefly and citrus black fly. Some of his most notable finds include an illegal mango tree shipped from Puerto Rico and a guava fruit from Florida that was infested with invasive Caribbean fruit flies.

Beyond fieldwork, Michelle and Kernul have also done outreach for Sacramento County, promoting the California Agricultural Detector Dog Program and its importance at numerous events each year including Ag Day at the Capitol, Bring Your Child to Work days at both the California Department of Food and Agriculture and Sacramento County as well as youth-focused agricultural events across the region.




After six years of service on the Agriculture Pest Exclusion Team, Kernul is officially hanging up his vest and heading into retirement. In California, agricultural detector dogs must retire at age nine, but for Kernul that comes with the best perk of all: a forever home. Michelle will be officially adopting him, ensuring his next chapter is full of many well-deserved treats.

While funding for Kernul's position traditionally came from the state, the California Department of Food and

Agriculture is reallocating detector dog resources across California and has chosen not to replace the K9 role in Sacramento County. We are fortunate, however, that Michelle King will remain with us and continue serving as a Senior Agricultural & Standards Inspector.

Thank you Kernul for your service to the county and endless, wagging enthusiasm. Enjoy retirement!
